Southern: Shaftesbury Romp Home

MAN OF the moment, Steve Harris, rounded of a successful weekend's racing by proving the star attraction at the Southern 12-Stage Road Relay at Wimbledon on April 6th. Running the fourth stage for Shaftesbury, the day after his impressive AAA 10km Championship win, Harris not only outpaced Seb Coe, also on that stage, but took Steve Ovett's short course record by four seconds with a nippy 14:48 and made a substantial contribution to an excellent team effort from his club, who ran out winners after four hours of activity.

Shaftesbury it was who led after the first frantic long stage, Kingston Mills giving them a two seconds advantage over a trio of Gary Couch (Bas), Graham Spring (Lut) and Alan Guilder (GEC). Chelmsford's John Freeman took his team into a three seconds lead on the second stage, the first short one, and Shaftesbury's move down to fourth was the only time they were to be out of pole position after John Sherban's 24:34 on leg three left them nine seconds clear of Luton. Tony Simmons it was who had taken them into second spot, while further down gaps were already starting to lengthen considerably.

Harris's stint on **fourth** pulled Shaftesbury away to the tune of 1:40, but his wasn't the only impressive run. Taking advantage of the fact that in addition to Harris, only four others broke 16 minutes for this short leg, Seb Coe took Haringey up from 11th into third behind Luton, with a 15:09 clocking, although still 49 seconds adrift. That was almost how the frame stayed to the end of the race as sharp runs from Kirk Dumpleton (24:53), Julian Goater (24:17) and Gary Huckwell (24:56), not to mention a competent 15:48 short anchor from James Espir, ensured that Shaftesbury's winning margin lengthened to an incredible 4:17 at the finish.

Billy Dee (24:15) and Neil Tennant were the main reasons why Luton too were comfortable in second, with a 3:17 buffer, but Haringey were to fall foul of a steady improvement by Aldershot after a disappointing early race which had seen them as low as 17th on stage three. They hauled themselves back though, through solid runs from Phil Ledger (25:32), Mark Kendall (25:47) and John Hood (25:18), which left them poised a close fourth at the start of the final stage, on which they improved by one to take a hard earned set of medals at Haringey's expense.

To be honest it wasn't one of the classier relays of recent years, and there was only ever going to be one winning team. Shaftesbury had by far the most superior squad, and the gaps at the finish give some indication of the lack of conflict at the top end in the latter half of the race. That apart, there were one or two pretty good individual runs, not least the quiet 24:15 on stage 11 by Mark Rowland which took Phoenix from 30th to 26th, an inconspicuous equal fastest of the day.
